

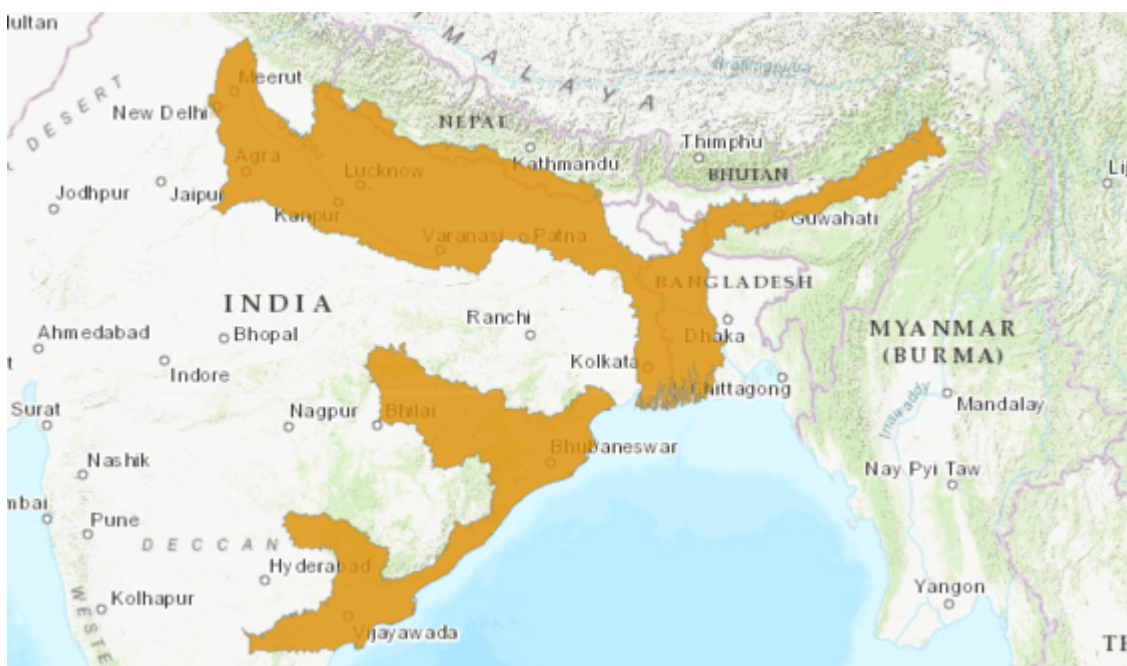
Indian Tent Turtle
